Charging and Remissions Policy

1. Aims

Our school aims to:

- > Have robust, clear processes in place for charging and remissions
- > Clearly set out the types of activity that can be charged for and when charges will and will not be made
- Offer a range of activities and visits whilst minimising the financial barriers that may prevent some pupils from taking full advantage of these opportunities

2. Legislation and guidance

- > This policy is based on advice from the Department for Education (DfE) on charging for school activities and the Education Act 1996, sections 449 to 462 of which set out the law on charging for school activities in England.
- > It's also based on guidance from the DfE on statutory policies for schools and academy trusts.

3. Definitions

- > Charge: a fee payable for specifically defined activities
- > Remission: the cancellation of a charge which would normally be payable

4. Roles and responsibilities

4.1 The governing board

The governing board also has overall responsibility for monitoring the implementation of this policy.

Responsibility for approving the charging and remissions policy has been delegated to the Staffing and Finance Committee.

Monitoring the implementation of this policy has been delegated to the Chair of the Staffing and Finance Committee.

4.2 Headteachers

The headteacher is responsible for ensuring staff are familiar with the charging and remissions policy, and that it is being applied consistently.

4.3 Staff

Staff are responsible for:

- > Implementing the charging and remissions policy consistently
- > Notifying the headteacher of any specific circumstances which they are unsure about or where they are not certain if the policy applies

The school will provide staff with appropriate training in relation to this policy and its implementation.

4.4 Parents

Parents are expected to notify staff or the headteacher of any concerns or queries regarding the charging and remissions policy.

5. Where charges cannot be made

Below we set out what we cannot charge for:

5.1 Education

- > Admission applications
- > Education provided during school hours (including the supply of any materials, books, instruments or other equipment)
- > Education provided outside school hours if it is part of:
 - A syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
 - Religious education
- > Instrumental or vocal tuition, for pupils learning individually or in groups, unless the tuition is provided at the request of the pupil's parent
- > Entry for a prescribed public examination if the pupil has been prepared for it at the school
- > Examination re-sit(s) if the pupil is being prepared for the re-sit(s) at the school

5.2 Transport

- > Transporting registered pupils to or from the school premises, where the local authority has a statutory obligation to provide transport
- > Transporting registered pupils to other premises where the governing board or local authority has arranged for pupils to be educated
- > Transport that enables a pupil to meet an examination requirement when he or she has been prepared for that examination at the school

5.3 Residential visits

Education provided on any visit that takes place during school hours, however there may be a request for a voluntary contribution towards covering some of these costs.

Education provided on any visit that takes place outside school hours if it is part of:

- The National Curriculum
- A syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
- Religious education

Supply teachers, covering for teachers who are absent from school, accompanying pupils on a residential visit

6. Where charges can be made

Below we set out what we can charge for:

6.1 School meals

School meals are automatically free for all foundation, year 1 and year 2 children under the Government's Universal Infant Free School Meals. In addition, school meals are free for pupils across all year groups if they meet the eligibility criteria and have applied to the Local Authority. There is therefore no charge for children who are entitled to free school meals. Pupils who are not entitled to free school meals will be charged a set amount per meal (as set by the LA).

6.2 Education

- > Any materials, books, instruments or equipment, where the child's parent wishes him or her to own them
- > Optional extras (see section 6.2)
- > Music and vocal tuition, in limited circumstances (see section 6.3)
- > Certain early years provision
- > Community facilities
- > Examination re-sit(s) if the pupil is being prepared for the re-sit(s) at the school **and** the pupil fails, without good reason, to meet any examination requirement for a syllabus

6.3 Optional extras

We are able to charge for activities known as 'optional extras'. In these cases, schools can charge for providing materials, books, instruments or equipment. The following are optional extras:

- > Education provided outside of school time that is not part of:
 - The National Curriculum
 - A syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
 - Religious education
- > Examination entry fee(s) if the registered pupil has not been prepared for the examination(s) at the school
- > Transport (other than transport that is required to take the pupil to school or to other premises where the local authority or governing board has arranged for the pupil to be provided with education)
- > Board and lodging for a pupil on a residential visit
- > Extended day services offered to pupils (such as breakfast clubs, after-school clubs, tea and supervised homework sessions)

When calculating the cost of optional extras, an amount may be included in relation to:

- > Any materials, books, instruments or equipment provided in connection with the optional extra
- > The cost of buildings and accommodation
- > Non-teaching staff
- > Teaching staff engaged under contracts for services purely to provide an optional extra (including supply teachers engaged specifically to provide the optional extra)

> The cost, or an appropriate proportion of the costs, for teaching staff employed to provide tuition in playing a musical instrument, or vocal tuition, where the tuition is an optional extra

Any charge made in respect of individual pupils will not be greater than the actual cost of providing the optional extra activity, divided equally by the number of pupils participating.

Any charge will not include an element of subsidy for any other pupils who wish to take part in the activity but whose parents are unwilling or unable to pay the full charge.

In cases where a small proportion of the activity takes place during school hours, the charge cannot include the cost of alternative provision for those pupils who do not wish to participate.

Parental agreement is necessary for the provision of an optional extra which is to be charged for.

6.4 Music tuition

Schools can charge for vocal or instrumental tuition provided either individually or to groups of pupils, provided that the tuition is provided at the request of the pupil's parent.

Charges may not exceed the cost of the provision, including the cost of the staff giving the tuition.

Charges cannot be made:

- > If the teaching is an essential part of the National Curriculum
- > If the teaching is provided under the first access to the Key Stage 2 instrumental and vocal tuition programme
- > For a pupil who is looked after by a local authority

6.5 Residential visits

We can charge for board and lodging on residential visits, but the charge must not exceed the actual cost. Travel charges may apply when the residential activity takes place outside of school hours. The amount charged will be calculated to cover the unit cost per pupil.

7. Voluntary contributions

As an exception to the requirements set out in section 5 of this policy, the school is able to ask for voluntary contributions from parents to fund activities which would not otherwise be possible.

Some activities for which the school may ask parents for voluntary contributions include:

School Trips

Sports Events

External visitors to the school

There is no obligation for parents to make any contribution, and no child will be excluded from an activity if their parents are unwilling or unable to pay.

If the school is unable to raise enough funds to cover 90% of the cost for an activity or visit then it will be cancelled. However, if a parent <u>refuses</u> to pay, the governors may seek for clarification as to why this is the case, as it could be deemed unfair to the majority who continue to make the contributions

8. Activities we charge for

The school will charge for the following activities:

Breakfast and After School Wrap Around Club

Some after school clubs that are put on by staff that require special equipment or ingredients

Any activity that involves commercial coach travel

9 . Damage to property and breakages

Where school property has been wilfully damaged by a student or parent the school may charge those responsible for some or all of the cost of repair or replacement.

Where property belonging to a third party has been damaged by a pupil, and the school has been charged, the school may charge some or all of the cost to those responsible.

Whether or not these charges will be made will be decided by the Head teacher and dependent on the situation.

Where a member of the school staff has broken or misplaced property that they look after for a child OR had removed from a child, then the school will replace the article. Otherwise the school will not be responsible for any loss or breakages outside of the conditions of the above paragraph.

10. Remissions and Concessions

The school will give consideration to the remission of charges to parents who receive the following support payments:

- Income Support
- Income based Job-Seekers Allowance
- Child Tax Credit
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Working Tax Credit run-on
- Universal Credit

The School may choose to subsidise part or all of the payment of some charges for certain activities and pupils, and this will be determined by the Head Teacher.
